Autism Spectrum Disorder: Overview

Autism Spectrum Disorder is a complex neurodevelopmental condition marked by challenges in social communication, repetitive behaviours, and restricted interests. Approximately 1 in 70 Australians are on the autism spectrum, with prevalence rates continuing to rise. This is largely attributed to several factors such as broadening diagnostic criteria, heightened awareness and screening efforts, genetic and environmental factors and increased support and services.

Ideally, a multidisciplinary approach is recommended to diagnose ASD, which typically consists of the GP, child and adolescent psychiatrist/paediatrician, psychologist, speech pathologist and occupational therapist. For patients aged 25 years or under, Medicare rebates are available to help cover some of the cost (see Pitstop Insights below).

The future strategies to support ASD should be characterized by collaboration, flexibility, and a commitment to fostering an inclusive society. By embracing a holistic and personcentered approach, we can work towards creating a world where individuals on the autism spectrum are recognized, understood, and provided with the necessary support to thrive.

Pitstop Insights: Complex Neurodevelopmental Disorders - MBS pathway



MBS items are available for assessing, diagnosing and treating patients with a Complex Neurodevelopmental Disorder (NDD), such as Autism Spectrum Disorder.

Is this similar to the Helping Children With Autism (HCWA) program?

This program has replaced HCWA and incorporated major changes primarily in the expansion of the age of eligibility, from under 13 to under 25 years. The aim is to facilitate equitable access to individuals presenting late with neurodevelopmental disorders.

How does this work?

- If you identify persisting neurodevelopmental concerns for your patient, you may refer
 them to either a consultant psychiatrist or paediatrician for a comprehensive
 assessment and diagnostic clarification.
- Where the psychiatrist determines the patient requires additional assessments to formulate a diagnosis, through the assistance of an Allied Health practitioner, they are able to refer the patient to an eligible Allied Health provider. Medicare rebates provide for a total of 8 Allied Health assessment services per patient per lifetime.

What happens next?

Once the psychiatrist has made a diagnosis of a complex NDD, they must develop a treatment and management plan. The psychiatrist can then refer the individual to eligible Allied Health practitioners for the provision of treatment services.



A total of **20 Allied Health Treatment services per patient per lifetime** are available, which focuses on interventions to address developmental disabilities or impairments.
